

Speaker: Eileen Kawola, Retired Social Studies Teacher, Member, Children Affected by HIV-AIDS (CHABHA)

Topic: "A Tragic Toll on Children: AIDS Orphans In Rwanda"

There are 12 million African children who have been orphaned by AIDS, and that number is expected to reach 25 million by 2010. CHABHA works in four African countries, and in Rwanda, CHABHA works to support children who many times are now head of household, parenting their siblings. The focus of the presentation will be to educate us about the two programs focuses, the conditions and problems, as well as the reasons for hope, with regard to children in Rwanda who have been affected by HIV/AIDS and the 1994 genocide.

Retired U-M math professor Galler dies

He was a pioneer in computer science; led youth orchestra

Bernard Galler, a retired University of Michigan professor and president of the Ypsilanti Youth Orchestra, died Monday from a pulmonary embolism. He was 77.

Galler, a mathematics professor, was one of the founders of the U-M Computer Science Department. He joined the U-M mathematics department in 1955. In the early 1970s, he helped form the computer science department and was a pioneer in the field of computer science, developing large-scale operating systems and computer languages. He also served as president of the Association for Computer Machinery in 1968, founded the Annals of History of Computing journal and was president of the Software Patent Institute. He retired from U-M in 1994.

Galler, who played the violin, cofounded the Ypsilanti Youth Orchestra eight years ago to provide a full orchestra experience for middle and high-school students who otherwise might not have access to such an opportunity. Alma Mayson, a member of the orchestra, said Galler was a highly professional musician who was willing to share his time and talent with youth. "His death is a tremendous loss to his family and to the orchestra," Mayson said. "We're going to miss him tremendously." Bill Hayes, a conductor and one of the founders of the orchestra, said in addition to his musical and teaching talent, Galler was a major fundraiser for the orchestra. "He guided people to accomplish their goals without getting in the way of doing so," Hayes said. "He loved music and children and was a great man."

Galler was born in Chicago, earned a bachelor's degree in mathematics from the University of Chicago, a master's degree from the University of California Los Angeles and a doctorate from the University of Chicago. Galler is survived by his wife, Enid, four children and nine grandchildren.
