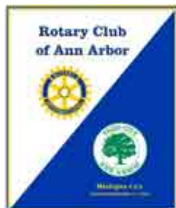

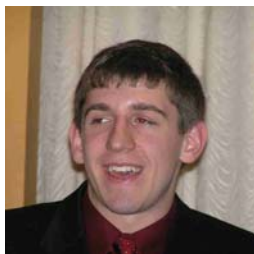

Notes from the Program of February 14, 2007

Karen Wixson introduced Margot Amrine, humanities and history teacher at Rudolf Steiner High School, on the topic "What do today's high school students need to succeed?" Margot began by saying she knew she'd made it in the world when she got to address Rotary, thus satisfying her mother's concern about whether she'd ever succeed. Steiner, she said, is different from other schools in that "we're not just college prep, we try to be life prep." The Steiner concept was incorporated in education in Ann Arbor in 1980; the high school, located at 2230 Pontiac Trail, dates to 1997.

At Steiner, chorus is a required subject, as is auto mechanics and etymology, along with courses in physics, chemistry and literature. There are 85 students in attendance with 25 teachers. The architecture resembles a European town. "We have a strong academic program," said Margot, "that addresses holistic education.

Students need idealism, she said. "Students have an innate sense of idealism and need it to be cultivated. And they need teachers who are idealistic and passionate about the subject matter they teach. Students also need intensity and challenges. At Steiner, they learn from each other and enjoy doing community service. There's an active community service club at Steiner.

Finally, students need excitement and adventure and joy. They may go on a trip to Maine to study tidepools or work for several days on a dairy farm. Steiner students, Margot said, develop strong academic skills, analytical thinking and self-discipline in a program infused with those traits she said students needed to succeed.

Interact Day 2007 [an article by Dan Romanchik]: Interact Day 2007 for District 6380 took place on Saturday, February 10, 2007. Thirty students from 12 Interact Clubs attended this year's event, including six from Pioneer High School and two from Huron High School. Also in attendance were several resource people and a couple of advisers. Lynn Morgan, a Farmington Rotarian and former district governor, hosted the event.



The Interactors heard about several RI project and programs:

- * Jamie Walsh of the U-M Rotaract Club spoke about her recent trip to India, where she participated in a polio immunization project and the Jaipur Limb Camp.
- * Branden LeClair, a RYLA alumna, described the Group Study Exchange program.
- * Eileen Heasley, from the Troy Rotary Club, spoke about the Bio-Sand Filter and her clean water project.
- * Ellen Blauer, a Berkeley Rotarian, told the students about the Rotary Youth Exchange.

The Interactors also exchanged ideas about their current projects. The Pioneer student talked about how they participated in our tree planting project and how they tutor ESL students at Pioneer. The Huron High students described their dinners at Ronald McDonald House. Other notable Interact projects included the LlamaRama button sale at Lamphere High that raised funds to buy a llama for a family in South America and a project at Rochester High School that sent books to a kindergarten in Mexico to help children there learn how to read.

It was quite inspiring to me to attend this event. These kids have truly taken to heart our Rotary motto, "Service Above Self," and we can all feel good about being able to support them in their efforts.

Another Rotary Scholarship Awarded at WCC: Our club's scholarship account at Washtenaw Community College has allowed Kenneth Mills to return to college after 25 years. He suffered a gunshot wound to the head in 1986 but has regained the ability to learn at the college level. He will be studying Computer Aided Design.
